



## McFarlane Nature Park Tree Collection

Since 1993, the Park has evolved to include plantings of native trees for the education of visitors, with an emphasis on Piedmont-native trees.

### *What is Piedmont native?*

The **Piedmont** is a plateau region located in the eastern United States. It sits between the **Atlantic Coastal Plain** and the main **Appalachian Mountains**, stretching from **New Jersey** in the north to central **Alabama** in the south.



### *Why Native?*

Native trees, and other climate adapted plants, have grown in cooperation with the animals, birds and butterflies of the region, and offer food and habitat that help the ecology thrive. In addition to our tree collection, all plants added to the Park are native to the region as well. Some, like our spectacular Ginkgos, are not at home here but preexisted the Trust's ownership.

## Who owns McFarlane?

McFarlane Nature Park is owned by The Cobb Land Trust Inc., a 100% volunteer run organization that receives no government funds.

The property is managed and maintained by volunteers and funded entirely by donations from friends and neighbors.

An onsite caretaker lives in the 1941 farmhouse and is responsible for general upkeep.

Master Gardener Volunteers of Cobb County maintain and plant the extensive native plant gardens.

Many Eagle Scout projects have contributed to the hardscape of the Park and made it more useable for individuals and groups who plan activities at the Park.
